#### **Swimming Pool**

After a lengthy winter rest the swimming pool has exceeded its minimum temperature and is back in use. The pupils of Devonshire Hill Primary School were the first of 2013 to test the temperature and, since then, pupils from two other schools have taken the plunge. ### **Camping Equipment for Duke of Edinburgh Award Groups**

Following the increased popularity of the Duke of Edinburgh courses run here at Pendarren, we have purchased some new equipment to help those groups who are missing a few bits. We now have a good supply of tents, cooking stoves, sleeping bags and roll mats for those who need additional kit. Now all we need is the summer!



The advantage of using Pendarren for D of E groups is that the Pendarren instructors have local knowledge of the area including the black spots for phone signals and hazardous areas such as roads with no verges. Pendarren instructors have been trained and assessed to look after groups in the terrain that D of E groups will encounter; qualifications include the Mountain Leader Award and Mountain Instructor Certificate. We also try to keep the price as low as possible to ensure that the D of E Award is available to all.

#### Pendarren's Trees

We have had an inspection of the trees in our grounds and some are nearing the end of their lives. We have planted many common trees and hope to replant some specimen trees that we have lost. If anyone wants to donate or bring a tree our field faces south west, is mostly well drained and the soil is fairly neutral. Our trees include oak, ash, beech, elm, hazel, apple (several varieties), coast redwood, Corsican pine, Scots pine, weeping willow, silver birch, crack willow, weeping fir, leylandii, laurel, acer, sycamore, sweet chestnut, poplar, rhododendron, larch, yew and cypresses. In the autumn we are going to send some fruit and sprigs from our old apple trees to some experts to find out which varieties we have. That's if the staff don't eat them all first!

#### The Canoe Store

As was reported in the last Pendarren newsletter, we have taken delivery of an extra canoe fleet, thanks to a grant from the Tottenham Grammar School Foundation and a donation from The Friends of Pendarren. In order to accommodate the extra canoe equipment the storage area has been rebuilt by Pendarren staff.

The Friends continue to purchase replacement cameras and the CD's/DVD's.


The Friends also subsidise Daniel Morden the Storyteller.

#### WILDLIFE AT PENDARREN

The Pendarren rabbit population fluctuates over the years, this year there are plenty of young rabbits grazing on our lawns in the morning. For several years now we have seen a white rabbit on the bank above the high ropes course, we now have two white rabbits.



We have found evidence of another bat species at Pendarren – this time it is a noctule bat. This species likes to hide in deep crevices in the bark of old trees, in this case it has chosen one of our Coast Redwoods which has a red fibrous bark. Our redwoods are small at around 30m but they are still growing, the tallest ones in the world are over 100m.

The house martins have just arrived back at Pendarren having spent the winter in Africa. They are going to have to rebuild some nests as these were disturbed during the refurbishment last autumn. They traditionally nest under the eaves of the main house.

A pheasant appears to have established his territory at Pendarren and we hear him calling from various bits of shrubbery around the grounds.

The sheep are also back in the field, they appeared to be very excited when they arrived – there was so much grass to eat it was if they could not decide which bit to eat next!



#### **ADMIN**

#### **Educational Visits - HSV1**

Haringey Health and Safety team have designated Pendarren House as Category 3 for school visits; this requires Haringey schools to inform Haringey Health and Safety Team of their visit. As Pendarren is inspected by Haringey's Health and Safety Team, some parts of the form do not need to be filled in with as much detail as would be required if you took groups out of school to a organisation that was not managed by Haringey. Guidance on filling in HSV1 – Application for Approval of an Educational Visit – is on our website under 'downloads'.

Secondary schools continue to think of new ways to use Pendarren House – we recently had a successful maths group from Hornsey School - and D of E expeditions have proved popular.

#### From an Ex Haringey teacher

I left Haringey nearly eleven years ago to work in a non-maintained special school in Essex. During the period from 1991 to 2002 I calculate I visited Pendarren eight times, so this was to be my ninth visit – this time with special needs 16 to 19 year olds rather than lively Year 5 and 6 pupils!

It was quite obvious from the website that essentially Pendarren was just the same as it always was: indeed, that it is why it is so successful. They have systems and

programmes that have worked over the years as well as excellent staff who contribute so much to the overall experience. The routines (e.g. the bedroom inspection and mealtime arrangements) were especially well suited to our autistic pupils.

So what has changed since 1991? There are new faces, but there is continuity with the staff and in over 40 years there have only been three heads of centre! Looking back at some old photos, there have of course been some changes: the climbing frame is no longer in the garden, but in place there is the low ropes course. The staff bathroom now has a shower instead of a bath and there has obviously been refurbishment, the classrooms now having carpet instead of a concrete floor! Also, The Firs is a fantastic acquisition and they have caught up with the 21st century with whiteboards, WiFi...and a mobile phone signal! A very endearing constant with Pendarren is the smells - the best being the home cooked food and baking... the least pleasant the morningafter smell in the drying room!

Fantastic memories... and another great week and thoroughly suited to our pupils.
