November 2011 has been exceptionally warm – in complete contrast to last year, when the snow hit Pendarren early! The Pendarren staff were prepared and had grit delivered in good time for the anticipated snow but the first dusting wasn't seen on the mountains until Tuesday 6th December. This has been a great relief to the staff, who don't have to walk two miles through the snow every day to get to and from work, and the budget, as the saving in heating oil costs has allowed us to carry out some essential maintenance tasks. Rumour has it that we shall be building snowmen and throwing snowballs in the New Year.......

The salmon were a little late in their journey up the river this year, again because of exceptional weather. They had to wait for a downpour of rain to swell the rivers before they could attempt the journey. Unfortunately, none of the Pendarren staff saw them as they rushed up in the first flood of autumn, although many of the local villagers spent hours waiting to witness the moment. Apparently, two hundred salmon were recorded in the weir pool on the Grwyne this year, a record.

A useless but fascinating fact, which may be of interest to some of our readers, is that the cave Ogof Draenen, which lies inside Blorenge mountain (across the valley from Pendarren House) was Britain's longest cave, with 70 kilometres of tunnels, but has now been relegated to second place. Britain's longest cave is now in the northern Pennines with one hundred and twenty kilometres of passage. Those of the Pendarren instructors who claimed to have been in Britain's longest cave will now have to travel north!

And lastly, for those of you who have visited recently or who will be coming in the New Year, you will know that autumn and winter have arrived at Pendarren as the soup has appeared at lunch time!

IMPORTANT! CHANGES TO BOOKING ADMINISTRATION

"Pendarren is incredible; each day you do a selection of exciting activity: abseiling, rock climbing and a lot more!"




North Harringay Primary School 14 - 18 November 2011

DEVELOPMENTS
